



From our Pastor's Desk

Dear Family:

To love one's neighbor as oneself is demanding enough. So, to love one's enemy is certainly very demanding. It is, however, not an impossible task to fulfill. Already in the Old Testament, centuries before Christ's commandment, David practiced it, as we heard it today on the first reading from the First Book of Samuel. David's forgiveness of his enemy, King Saul, teaches us that love of our enemies begins with and it is sustained by forgiveness. That David forgave King Saul who was on a mission to kill him shows how great David's forgiveness was.

Such forgiveness is only possible when one appreciates how much God has forgiven each one of us. We do not have a record of David's sins up to this time of his life. However, in the latter part of his life, there are records of his sins of adultery with Uriah's wife, of causing the death of Uriah and of marrying Uriah's wife. David's appreciation of God's mercy despite these heinous crimes tells us that he was a man who was overwhelmed by God's forgiveness. We would, likewise, be moved to forgive our enemies if we appreciate the extent to which God forgives us.

Such forgiveness is only possible when one appreciates that every human enemy is "the Lord's anointed". When Abishai, David's assistant, requested to kill King Saul, David denied the request, saying: "Do not harm him, for who can lay hands on the Lord's anointed and remain unpunished" (1 Sam. 26:9). Often, "the Lord's anointed" is understood as a man/servant of God or a leader. However, since all Christians have been anointed at baptism as children of God, every Christian is the Lord's anointed. Furthermore, in a broader sense, every human being is God's anointed because he/she is a child of God the Creator. Therefore, the person we consider as our enemy is also considered by God as His child. Consequently, we should not harm him/her.

Such forgiveness is only possible when one is convinced that an advantage over the enemy is by divine grace. David realized that the advantage he had over King Saul who was asleep was not something that resulted from his intelligence or strength. He knew it was by God's grace. Thus, David told the king: "Today, though the Lord delivered you into my grasp, I would not harm the Lord's anointed." (1 Sam. 26:23). Likewise, we will not hurt our enemies if we believe that our advantage is a moment of grace given by God to do good and not to harm. It is a moment of grace by which God wants us to demonstrate how we want Him to later judge us: "forgive us our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us" (Matt. 6:12).

Such forgiveness is only possible when one believes that God is the ultimate judge and the one who rewards. When David had spared the life of the king and he had gone out of the cave, he shouted out from a distant: "Here is the spear, O king! ... The Lord rewards every man for his righteousness and faithfulness" (1 Sam. 26:22-23). Like David, we should deal mercifully with our enemies, since ultimately God will judge us all.

St. Luke brings similar themes before us in today's Gospel. Christ reminds us to love our enemies, to do good to those who hate us, to bless those who curse us, to pray for those who mistreat us. He ends with, "For the measure with which you measure will in return be measured out to you." This is one of the most challenging passages in all of scripture and we, Catholics, must take it seriously. Christ tells us to "forgive and you will be forgiven," and it strikes at that same very human sense of justice offended when David lets Saul go free. This command, though, is perfectly in line with everything else Christ taught us. Christ tells us we are to "love on another as I have loved you," and he was willing to sacrifice his life on this earth to grant us salvation. think of our faith in Christ as something dangerous or that makes claims upon our behavior, but the radical demand of Christ in the Gospel today does exactly that. Christ calls us to love our enemies, to stop condemning and judging them, and to forgive them. He even calls us to lay our lives on the line to save the souls of those who hate us, just as He did.

When we look at the world around us, living these teachings appears impossible. Within our cities, states, and nations we encounter those who seek to harm us. (Or at least they seem to!) We might even feel this within our church, at the parish, diocesan, and global levels. Whether or not this is the intention of the other parties involved, it does not matter. The call from Christ is the same: "Be merciful, just as your Father is merciful." Christ's message is not to be merciful to those with whom you share political views, nor is it to love those who love the same music at Mass as you do. It is to love your enemies and do good to those who hurt you. The spiritual works of mercy teach us to "instruct the ignorant" and "admonish sinners," but also to "forgive injuries" and "bear wrongs patiently." Forgiveness and mercy are not signs of weakness, but of strength. David showed strength by sparing Saul. He knew that God, the almighty creator, would protect him and save him; so, he had nothing to fear from Saul. (That does not mean David escaped suffering!) When we forgive and show mercy, we follow David in placing our trust in God and in his strength, secure in the knowledge that our "reward will be great" and we "will be children of the Most High."

St. Paul writes that we are born into life as the "first man," an earthly creature. This earthly man is subject to the whims of the world. Vengeance, disguised as justice, and other evils lurk behind basic human emotions and desires. But through our baptisms, we Christians were reborn into a new man, the "second man," from heaven, and given his image to bear. We must choose which man we will allow to grow within us, that is, we must choose which image we will bear: the earthly or the heavenly. This is not a choice to make lightly. If we conform our lives to the earthly man, we shall return to dust as the first Adam did. If we conform our lives to the heavenly man, then we shall rise to eternal life with Christ, the new Adam.

We must remember that we are **One Body, One Spirit, One Family!** Blessed Virgin Mary, Saint Katharine Drexel, Saint Michael the Archangel, Pope Saint Pius X and Blessed Dr. José Gregorio Hernández, pray for us.

Del Escritorio de Nuestro Párroco

Querida familia:

Amar al prójimo como a uno mismo es bastante exigente. Por lo tanto, amar al enemigo es ciertamente muy exigente. Sin embargo, no es una tarea imposible de cumplir. Ya en el Antiguo Testamento, siglos antes del mandamiento de Cristo, David lo practicaba, como lo escuchamos hoy en la primera lectura del Primer Libro de Samuel. El perdón de David a su enemigo, el rey Saúl, nos enseña que el amor a nuestros enemigos comienza con el perdón y se sostiene con él. El hecho de que David perdonara al rey Saúl, que estaba en una misión para matarlo, muestra cuán grande fue el perdón de David.

Un perdón así solo es posible cuando uno aprecia cuánto nos ha perdonado Dios. No tenemos un registro de los pecados de David hasta este momento de su vida. Sin embargo, en la última parte de su vida, hay registros de sus pecados de adulterio con la esposa de Urias, de causar la muerte de Urias y de casarse con la esposa de Urias. El aprecio que David sentía por la misericordia de Dios a pesar de estos crímenes atroces nos dice que era un hombre abrumado por el perdón de Dios. De la misma manera, nosotros nos sentiríamos impulsados a perdonar a nuestros enemigos si apreciáramos hasta qué punto Dios nos perdona.

Un perdón así solo es posible cuando uno aprecia que cada enemigo humano es "el ungido del Señor". Cuando Abisay, el asistente de David pidió matar al rey Saúl, David se negó a hacerlo, diciendo: "No lo mates. ¿Quién puede atentar contra el ungido del Señor y quedar sin pecado?" (1 Sam. 26:9). A menudo, "el ungido del Señor" se entiende como un hombre/siervo de Dios o un líder. Sin embargo, dado que todos los cristianos han sido ungidos en el bautismo como hijos de Dios, cada cristiano es el ungido del Señor. Además, en un sentido más amplio, cada ser humano es el ungido de Dios porque es hijo de Dios el Creador. Por lo tanto, la persona que consideramos nuestro enemigo también es considerada por Dios como Su hijo. Consecuentemente, no debemos hacerle daño.

Un perdón así solo es posible cuando uno está convencido de que la ventaja sobre el enemigo es por gracia divina. David se dio cuenta de que la ventaja que tenía sobre el rey Saúl, que estaba dormido, no era algo que resultara de su inteligencia o fuerza. Sabía que era por gracia de Dios. Por eso, David le dijo al rey: "El Señor te puso hoy en mis manos, pero yo no quise atentar contra el ungido del Señor" (1 Sam. 26:23). De la misma manera, no haremos daño a nuestros enemigos si creemos que nuestra ventaja es un momento de gracia dado por Dios para hacer el bien y no para destruir. Es un momento de gracia por el cual Dios quiere que demostremos cómo queremos que Él nos juzgue después: "perdona nuestras ofensas, como también nosotros perdonamos a nuestros ofensores" (Mt. 6:12).

Un perdón así solo es posible cuando uno cree que Dios es el juez y quien recibe la recompensa al final. Cuando David perdonó la vida al rey y éste salió de la cueva, gritó desde lejos: "Rey Saúl, aquí está tu lanza, [...] El Señor te dará a cada uno según su justicia y su lealtad" (1 Sam 26,22-23). Al igual que David, debemos tratar con misericordia a nuestros enemigos, ya que, en última instancia, Dios nos juzgará a todos.

San Lucas nos presenta temas similares en el Evangelio de hoy. Cristo nos recuerda que debemos amar a nuestros enemigos, hacer el bien a quienes nos odian, bendecir a quienes nos maldicen, orar por quienes nos maltratan. Termina diciendo: "Porque con la misma medida con que midan, serán medidos". Este es uno de los pasajes más desafiantes de todas las Escrituras y nosotros los católicos debemos tomarlo en serio. Cristo nos dice: "Perdonen y serán perdonados", y ataca ese mismo sentido muy humano de justicia ofendida cuando David deja libre a

Saúl. Este mandato, sin embargo, está en perfecta sintonía con todo lo demás que Cristo nos enseñó. Cristo nos dice que debemos "amar al prójimo como yo te he amado", y él estuvo dispuesto a sacrificar su vida en esta tierra para concedernos la salvación. Muchos católicos –muchos cristianos– no piensan en nuestra fe en Cristo como algo peligroso o que impone exigencias a nuestro comportamiento, pero la exigencia radical de Cristo en el Evangelio de hoy hace exactamente eso. Cristo nos llama a amar a nuestros enemigos, a dejar de condenarlos y juzgarlos, y a perdonarlos. Incluso nos llama a arriesgar nuestras vidas para salvar las almas de quienes nos odian, tal como Él lo hizo.

Cuando observamos el mundo que nos rodea, vivir estas enseñanzas parece imposible. Dentro de nuestras ciudades, estados y naciones nos encontramos con quienes buscan hacernos daño, o al menos eso parece. Incluso podríamos sentir esto dentro de nuestra iglesia, a nivel parroquial, diocesano y global. Sea o no ésta la intención de las otras partes involucradas, no importa. El llamado de Cristo es el mismo: "Sean misericordiosos, como su Padre es misericordioso". El mensaje de Cristo no es ser misericordiosos con aquellos con quienes comparto opiniones políticas, ni es amar a aquellos que aman la misma música en la Misa que yo. Es amar a tus enemigos y hacer el bien a aquellos que te hacen daño. Las obras espirituales de misericordia nos enseñan a "instruir a los ignorantes" y "amanecer a los pecadores", pero también a "perdonar las injurias" y "soportar las penas".

El perdón y la misericordia no son signos de debilidad, sino de fortaleza. David demostró fortaleza al perdonar a Saúl. Sabía que Dios, el creador todopoderoso, lo protegería y lo salvaría; por lo tanto, no tenía nada que temer de Saúl. Eso no significa que David se libró del sufrimiento. Cuando perdonamos y mostramos misericordia, seguimos a David al poner nuestra confianza y fortaleza en Dios, seguros de saber que nuestra "recompensa será grande" y que "seremos hijos del Altísimo".

San Pablo escribe que nacemos a la vida como el "primer hombre", una criatura terrenal. Este hombre terrenal está sujeto a los caprichos del mundo. La venganza, disfrazada de justicia, y otros males se esconden detrás de las emociones y los deseos humanos básicos. Pero a través de nuestros bautismos, nosotros los cristianos renacemos en un hombre nuevo, el "segundo hombre", del cielo, y se nos dio su imagen para que la plasmemos. Debemos elegir qué hombre permitiremos que crezca dentro de nosotros, es decir, debemos elegir qué imagen llevaremos: la terrenal o la celestial. No es una elección que se pueda hacer a la ligera. Si conformamos nuestra vida al hombre terreno, volveremos al polvo como lo hizo el primer Adán. Si conformamos nuestra vida al hombre celestial, resucitaremos a la vida eterna con Cristo, el nuevo Adán.

Debemos siempre recordar que somos **;Un Cuerpo, Un Espíritu, Una Familia!** Santísima Virgen María, Santa Katharine Drexel, San Miguel Arcángel, Papa San Pío X y el Beato Dr. José Gregorio Hernández, rueguen por nosotros.

;Suyo en Cristo Jesús!





Saint of the week

St. Gregory of Narek

St. Gregory of Narek (Grigor Narekatsi) was a 10th-century Armenian mystic, monk, poet, and theologian. He is one of the most significant figures in Armenian Christianity and was declared a Doctor of the Church by Pope Francis in 2015, recognizing his universal spiritual contributions. Gregory's profound works of devotion, especially his masterpiece, the Book of Lamentations, have inspired generations of Christians, particularly within the Armenian Apostolic and Catholic Churches.

Gregory was born around 951 in Narek, a village in the Vaspurakan province of Armenia (modern-day Turkey). He came from a prominent religious family; his father, Khosrov, was a bishop and theologian. After the early death of his mother, Gregory was raised and educated at the monastery of Narek, where he spent the rest of his life as a monk.

Gregory is most renowned for his Book of Lamentations, also called Speaking with God from the Depths of the Heart. This masterpiece is a collection of 95 poetic prayers and meditations, filled with deep humility, penitence, and mystical union with God. It reflects Gregory's intense awareness of human frailty and his yearning for divine mercy and communion. His writings are steeped in the Scriptures, rich in theological insight, and permeated with poetic beauty. Gregory also composed hymns, commentaries on Scripture, and theological treatises. His works were not only theological but also deeply pastoral, helping believers in their spiritual struggles.

Gregory lived a life of intense prayer, fasting, and ascetic discipline at the Narek Monastery. He is often depicted as a mystic who experienced visions of divine love and grace. His writings convey a profound sense of the sinner's need for God's mercy and the transformative power of divine forgiveness.

Though originally venerated within the Armenian Apostolic Church, Gregory's influence spread to the Catholic Church due to his theological and spiritual contributions. In 2015, Pope Francis declared him the 36th Doctor of the Church, calling him a bridge between the Eastern and Western Christian traditions. He is the first Armenian saint to receive this title.

He is a patron of those seeking healing, especially spiritual healing. His Book of Lamentations continues to inspire Christians worldwide as a guide to deeper prayer and repentance. St. Gregory of Narek remains a profound spiritual voice, calling Christians to deepen their relationship with God through prayer, repentance, and trust in divine mercy.

His feast day is February 27.



Santo de la semana

San Gregorio de Narek

San Gregorio de Narek (Grigor Narekatsi) fue un místico, monje, poeta y teólogo armenio del siglo X. Es una de las figuras más significativas del cristianismo armenio y fue declarado Doctor de la Iglesia por el Papa Francisco en 2015, en reconocimiento a sus contribuciones espirituales universales. Las profundas obras de devoción de Gregorio, especialmente su obra maestra, el Libro de las Lamentaciones, han inspirado a generaciones de cristianos, particularmente dentro de las Iglesias apostólica y católica armenia.

Gregorio nació alrededor de 951 en Narek, un pueblo en la provincia de Vaspurakan de Armenia (actual Turquía). Provenía de una prominente familia religiosa; su padre, Khosrov, era obispo y teólogo. Después de la temprana muerte de su madre, Gregorio fue criado y educado en el monasterio de Narek, donde pasó el resto de su vida como monje.

Gregorio es más conocido por su Libro de las Lamentaciones, también llamado Hablando con Dios desde lo más profundo del corazón. Esta obra maestra es una colección de 95 oraciones y meditaciones poéticas, llenas de profunda humildad, penitencia y unión mística con Dios. Refleja la intensa conciencia de Gregorio de la fragilidad humana y su anhelo de misericordia y comunión divinas. Sus escritos están impregnados de las Escrituras, son ricos en conocimiento teológico y están impregnados de belleza poética. Gregorio también compuso himnos, comentarios sobre las Escrituras y tratados teológicos. Sus obras no solo eran teológicas sino también profundamente pastorales, ayudando a los creyentes en sus luchas espirituales.

Gregorio vivió una vida de intensa oración, ayuno y disciplina ascética en el Monasterio de Narek. A menudo se lo representa como un místico que experimentó visiones del amor y la gracia divinos. Sus escritos transmiten un profundo sentido de la necesidad del pecador de la misericordia de Dios y el poder transformador del perdón divino.

Aunque originalmente fue venerado dentro de la Iglesia Apostólica Armenia, la influencia de Gregorio se extendió a la Iglesia Católica debido a sus contribuciones teológicas y espirituales. En 2015, el Papa Francisco lo declaró el 36.º Doctor de la Iglesia, y lo calificó como un puente entre las tradiciones cristianas orientales y occidentales. Es el primer santo armenio que recibe este título.

Es el patrón de quienes buscan la sanación, especialmente la sanación espiritual. Su Libro de las Lamentaciones sigue inspirando a los cristianos de todo el mundo como guía para una oración más profunda y el arrepentimiento. San Gregorio de Narek sigue siendo una voz espiritual profunda que llama a los cristianos a profundizar su relación con Dios a través de la oración, el arrepentimiento y la confianza en la misericordia divina.

Su festividad es el 27 de febrero.


