

From our Pastor's Desk

Dear Family:

Our readings this Sunday, the fourth Sunday of Lent, also called Laetare Sunday, which marks the middle of the Season of Lent, speak about reconciliation and coming home. St. Paul in the second reading speaks of Jesus appealing to us to be reconciled with God. In the Gospel we heard the well renowned story of the Prodigal Son.

In the first reading, the Jews, after their wanderings in the desert after leaving Egypt and being sustained through the manna from God have returned home. They stand at the threshold of Israel where they eat from what their new land, Canaan, provides them. They are no longer nomads in the desert but have come home to their promised land.

The Gospel for this Sunday also speaks of a coming home. It is the familiar story of the Prodigal Son. But too often, we forget why it was that Jesus spoke this parable to the Pharisees and Scribes. We need to remember that they had said "This man, Jesus, welcomes sinners and eats with them." Jesus is accused of receiving and eating with those he welcomes. It is important to understand the correct focus of this parable. The Father is the one welcoming and eating with his son.

It is common for the reader to identify himself or herself with the younger son in the story. He has broken the rules, been rebellious, abused freedom, hurt loved ones, hit the road, squandered his savings, given up his faith and religious community, gone to a different country, and more. There are many that can and do identify with that and see parts of their life story in that description. On the other hand, there are those who might identify with the older semi-prodigal son, who kept the rules, and lived the obligations. Many see themselves there.

But as significant as those comparisons might be, it is the Father who bears the image of God that Jesus shares with the Pharisees and the Scribes. They had an image of God as judgmental, concerned with legal duties and the like. This is the reason why they could not understand Jesus welcoming sinners and eating with them. We can conclude that we are most like God when we welcome home our children, just the way they are. What is the picture of God that you have? Perhaps it is not a picture. Perhaps it is a feeling, or a sense, or perhaps God appears to you are as a sound. The more we pray, the sharper and more in focus our image of God becomes and thus the better able we are to relate with God.

If we reflect on the Father in the parable, we might encounter this gospel with new eyes. Therefore, let us consider the parable not from the position of the sons, as relevant as that might be for this Lent, but from the position of the Father. The Father freely gives what the son asks for. This is a double freedom: there is the freedom of the Father to freely give and there is the freedom for the son to ask the Father. From the beginning we are shown an example of a relationship with the Father that is totally free. The Father does not try to control his son's life. We know that in any relationship that is free, where there is manipulation, control, or unfreedom, there cannot be love. The Father never stops loving the Son. When we turn away from the Father, similarly, which we are free to do, and sadly too often, the act of our turning away does not stop the Father from continuing to love us.

Jesus also tells us that the Father is watching and waiting. We were not told for how long. We could imagine that it was from the moment the son left. The Father never gave up. And while the son was a long way off, his Father saw him and was filled with compassion for him. From the distance, the Father recognized his child and does three things: he runs to his child, he embraces his child, and he kisses his child. After seeing this son return, there is no room in the Father's heart for judgment, but only joy and compassion. This is a father who is filled with love for his son. There is no lecture, there is no saying, "I told you so," there is no, "you should have listened to me." There is no recrimination or punishment.

The son then tries to begin his prepared speech and be a servant but the Father interrupts him and calls his servants and tells them to bring the best robe, a ring and sandals for his son. These symbolize commitment, faithfulness and demonstrates to his son, "you belong." When we return to God, His love for us, and his ways of telling us that we belong will be no less dramatic. Very often in the confessional one can witness such profound reconciliations.


The Father also deals with his elder son. The Father pleads with him to celebrate that what was once lost is now found, what was once dead is now brought back to life. This pleading to celebrate life is as much for the elder son as it was about the younger son. In celebrating life we become grateful people. Gratitude for life and joy in life are the two foundational states that we as Christians should have. That is why Jesus is telling the parable to the Pharisees and Scribes and it is only people who are grateful and joyful who can truly welcome home those who are lost, and eat with them.

I would like to invite you now to consider how welcoming you are in life, especially to people you might notice as wanting to come home. Look at your image of God and see how it compares with that of the Father in the Gospel today. Today, we are called to correct our image of God so that it matches more closely with the Father in the parable. This is the image of God that Jesus gives us. The Father who wants to put a robe on you, the finest clothes, that can cover any shame. He wants to put a ring on you, and in doing so, he is telling you, "you belong," "you are mine," "you are precious to me." He is the Father who says come now, just as you are. He wants to welcome you and renew you.

That is Jesus' image of God; that is the Father to whom he asks us to pray. That is the Father who makes us be **One Body, One Spirit, One Family!**

Blessed Virgin Mary, Saint Katharine Drexel, Saint Michael the Archangel, Pope Saint Pius X, St. Charbel and St. José Gregorio Hernández, pray for us.

Del Escritorio de Nuestro Párroco

Querida familia:

Las lecturas de este domingo, cuarto domingo de Cuaresma, también llamado Domingo Laetare, que marca la mitad del tiempo Cuaresmal, hablan de reconciliación y el regreso a casa. San Pablo, en la segunda lectura, nos habla de Jesús, quien nos llama a reconciliarnos con Dios. En el Evangelio, escuchamos la famosa historia del Hijo Pródigo.

En la primera lectura, los judíos, tras su peregrinación por el desierto tras salir de Egipto y ser alimentados con el maná de Dios, han regresado a casa y se encuentran en el umbral de Israel, donde comen de lo que su nueva tierra, Caná, les proporciona. Ya no son nómadas en el desierto, sino que han regresado a su tierra prometida.

El Evangelio de este domingo también habla de un regreso a casa. Es la conocida historia del Hijo Pródigo. Pero con demasiada frecuencia olvidamos por qué Jesús les contó esta parábola a los fariseos y escribas. Debemos recordar que ellos dijeron: "Este hombre, Jesús, recibe a pecadores y come con ellos". Jesús es acusado de acoger y comer con quienes recibe. Esto es importante para comprender el enfoque correcto de esta parábola. El Padre es quien acoge y come con su hijo.

Casi siempre, quien lee esta parábola se identifica con el hijo menor de la historia. Él ha roto las reglas, ha sido rebelde, ha abusado de su libertad, ha herido a sus seres queridos, se ha ido de viaje, ha malgastado sus ahorros, ha abandonado su fe y su comunidad religiosa, se ha mudado a otro país, y mucho más. Muchos se identifican con esto y ven parte de su historia de vida en esa descripción. Por otro lado, hay quienes podrían identificarse con el hijo mayor, semi pródigo, que cumplía las reglas y cumplía con sus obligaciones. Muchos aún podrían verse reflejados en él.

Pero por muy significativas que sean esas semejanzas, es el Padre quien porta la imagen de Dios que Jesús comparte con los fariseos y los escribas, quienes tienen una imagen de Dios sentencioso, preocupado por los deberes legales y cosas parecidas. Esta es la razón por la que no podían entender que Jesús recibiera a los pecadores y comiera con ellos. Podemos concluir que nos asemejamos más a Dios cuando recibimos a nuestros hijos en casa, tal como son. En consecuencia, ¿cuál es la imagen que tienes de Dios? Quizás no sea una imagen. Quizás sea un sentimiento, una sensación, o quizás Dios se te aparezca como un sonido. Cuanto más oramos, más nítida y definida se vuelve nuestra imagen de Dios y, por lo tanto, mejor nos relacionamos con Él.

Si reflexionamos sobre el Padre en la parábola, teniendo en cuenta que, si están de acuerdo conmigo, eso es lo que Jesús intenta comunicar aquí, podríamos ver este evangelio con nuevos ojos. Por lo tanto, consideremos la parábola no desde la perspectiva de los hijos, por muy relevante que sea para esta Cuaresma, sino observando lo que hace el Padre. El Padre da libremente lo que el hijo pide. Esta es una doble libertad: está la libertad del Padre para dar libremente y está la libertad del hijo para pedirle al Padre. Desde el principio se nos muestra un ejemplo de una relación con el Padre que es totalmente libre. El Padre no intenta controlar la vida de su hijo. Esto se debe a que sabemos que, en cualquier relación libre, donde hay manipulación, control o falta de libertad, no puede haber amor. El Padre nunca deja de amar a su Hijo.

De igual manera, cuando nos alejamos del Padre, algo que podemos hacer libremente, y lamentablemente con demasiada frecuencia, ese alejamiento no impide que el Padre siga amándonos. Jesús también nos dice que el Padre observa y espera. No se nos dijo por cuánto tiempo. Podemos imaginar que fue desde el momento en que el hijo se fue. El Padre nunca se rindió. Y aunque el hijo estaba lejos de su Padre, lo vio y sintió compasión por él. Desde la distancia, el Padre reconoció a su hijo e hizo tres cosas: corrió hacia él, lo abrazó y lo besó. Tras ver regresar a su hijo, no hubo lugar en el corazón del Padre para el juicio, sino solo alegría y compasión. Este es un padre lleno de amor por su hijo. No hay sermón, no hay un "te lo dije", no hay un "debiste haberme escuchado". No hay recriminación ni castigo.

El hijo intenta entonces comenzar su discurso preparado y ser un sirviente, pero el Padre lo interrumpe, llama a sus sirvientes y les dice que traigan la mejor túnica, un anillo y sandalias para su hijo. Estos simbolizan compromiso, fidelidad y le dicen a su hijo: "perteneces". Cuando volvemos a Dios, su amor por nosotros y sus maneras de decirnos que pertenecemos no serán menos dramáticas. Muy a menudo en el confesionario se pueden presenciar reconciliaciones tan profundas.


El Padre también trata con su hijo mayor. El Padre le ruega que celebre lo que una vez se perdió y ahora se encontró, lo que una vez estuvo muerto y ahora vuelve a la vida. Esta súplica de celebrar la vida es tanto para el hijo mayor como para el hijo menor. Al celebrar la vida nos convertimos en personas agradecidas; la gratitud por la vida y la alegría de vivir son dos estados fundamentales que debemos tener como cristianos. Por eso Jesús les cuenta la parábola a los fariseos y escribas, y solo las personas agradecidas y alegres pueden acoger verdaderamente a quienes están perdidos y compartir su tiempo con ellos.

Me gustaría invitarlos ahora a reflexionar sobre cuán acogedores son en la vida, especialmente con quienes quizás noten que desean volver a casa. Observen su imagen de Dios y compárenla con la del Padre en el Evangelio de hoy. Hoy estamos llamados a corregir nuestra imagen de Dios para que se asemeje más al Padre de la parábola. Esta es la imagen de Dios que nos da Jesús. El Padre que quiere ponerte un manto, la ropa más fina que pueda cubrir cualquier vergüenza. Quiere ponerte un anillo, y al hacerlo, te dice: "Me perteneces", "eres mío", eres precioso para mí". Es el Padre que dice: "Ven ahora, tal como eres". Quiere darte la bienvenida y renovarte.

Esa es la imagen de Dios que Jesús tiene; ese es el Padre a quien nos pide que oremos. Ese es el Padre que nos hace ser **¡Un Cuerpo, Un Espíritu, Una Familia!**

Santísima Virgen María, Santa Katharine Drexel, San Miguel Arcángel, Papa San Pío X, San Charbel y San José Gregorio Hernández, rueguen por nosotros.



Greeting

Another important element of the introductory rites for Mass is the greeting.

Upon arriving in the sanctuary, the priest venerates the altar, begins with a sign of the cross, and greets the assembly.

This is no ordinary greeting of daily life: Good morning; Good afternoon; or Good evening.

Rather, it is a greeting from Scripture: "The Lord be with you" (Jgs 6:12, and so on); "The grace of our Lord, Jesus Christ and the love of God and the fellowship of the Holy Spirit be with you all" (2 Cor 13:13); or "The grace and peace of God, our Father, and the Lord, Jesus Christ, be with you" (Gal 1:3).

This greeting and our reciprocal response to it, "And with your spirit" announces the awesome and profound mystery of God's presence in the church gathered for worship.



The next in-person WWME experience is in Boca Raton on **June 6th** to **June 8th**.




